Dear Inspector General Wertheimer:

Recently, my staff on the Homeland Security and Governmental Affairs Committee was made aware of various management changes and other issues regarding the Federal Housing Finance Agency Office of Inspector General (FHFA OIG), including claims that are before the Office of Special Counsel. In addition, the FHFA OIG's semiannual report to Congress suggests additional personnel changes that are concerning. In the course of making initial inquiries, my staff learned that Chairman Grassley's Judiciary Committee staff is currently seeking interviews with FHFA OIG staff and related documents.

This Committee is the primary oversight committee of the community of inspectors general. Independent, transparent, and accountable inspectors general are vital to rooting out waste, fraud, and abuse. To better understand the issues facing the FHFA OIG, I request the production of documents previously requested by Chairman Grassley. In addition, I ask that you make the same FHFA OIG staff available for joint Committee interviews as previously requested by Chairman Grassley.

The Committee on Homeland Security and Governmental Affairs is authorized by Rule XXV of the Standing Rules of the Senate to investigate "the efficiency, economy, and effectiveness of all agencies and departments of the Government." Additionally, S. Res. 73 (114th Congress) authorizes the Committee on Homeland Security and Governmental Affairs to examine "the efficiency and economy of operations of all branches of the Government including the possible existence of fraud, misfeasance, malfeasance, collusion, mismanagement, incompetence, corruption or unethical practices. . . ."<sup>2</sup>
